TOWN OF LEBANON ANNUAL TOWN MEETING – MAY 6, 2019 MINUTES

The annual town meeting of the electors and those qualified to vote at the town meetings of the Town of Lebanon was held on Monday, May 6, 2019 at Lyman Memorial High School, 917 Exeter Road. Audience 143.

First Selectman Betsy Petrie called the meeting to order at 7:30 PM.

The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance.

First Selectman Betsy Petrie then called for nominations for moderator.

Moved by Brian Green, seconded by Kevin Cwikla to appoint Diane Malozzi as moderator.

Moved by Rick Nelson, seconded by Brian Green to close nominations.

Vote called to nominate Diane Malozzi as Moderator. Motion passed

Moderator Malozzi reviewed Town Meeting rules and protocol.

Moved by John Bendoraitis, seconded by Betsy Petrie, to wave the reading of the call of the meeting. Vote called – Motion passed.

Moved by Betsy Petrie, second by Meghan Bruce to bring item 1 to the floor. "Consider and act upon approving the proposed 2019—20 Fiscal Year budget for the Town of Lebanon in the amount of twenty-six million two hundred and nine thousand and one hundred and nine dollars and no cents (\$26,209,109.00) for the General Town Government, Board of Education, Special Revenue Accounts and Capital Expenditures with Revenue Estimates of six million four hundred sixty six thousand dollars, four hundred forty three dollars and no cents (\$6,466,443.00) and the remainder to be raised by taxes with an estimated mil rate of 29.4 mils." Vote called — motion passed.

Board of Finance Chairman Elizabeth Charron spoke to the question as follows: The state is in the early stages of developing a two-year budget under the new Governor. The town receives revenue from the state and that revenue impacts our mil rate. Expenses minus the revenue gives us the amount needed to be raised by taxes. The Finance Board does not have firm numbers. The Finance Board does feel that this is a reasonable budget even with the revenue put in. The amount to be raised by taxes divided by the grand list gives our mil rate. The Grand List went up 3.5% which keeps our mil rate low. Even though our mil rate will remain flat, if this budget is approved, your taxes will go up or down depending on your new assessed value.

On the revenue side, the Governor's proposal indicates that there would be a big drop in the amount we would be receiving for Education Cost Sharing (ECS). In this current year, we under budgeted for what we would get for revenue. We had based it on what the Governor was proposing a year ago but the legislature approved more. According to the Governor's budget proposal, it will go down another \$450,000 in a year. If State Appropriations Committee proposal is approved, \$250,000 more could be received than this budget reflects. We will not know our revenue for some time.

On the Town expense side, there is a two percent salary increase per union contract, eight percent increase in medical insurance, and utility rates went up significantly this year. Ms. Charron clarified the Department of Public Works (DPW) budget causing some concern at the Public Hearing in April. There is a reduction of about \$32,000 in DPW. This is not a reduction, but a shift of \$60,000 from DPW to Town Improvement Plan (TIP). This is a fund we maintain for our infrastructure. Within the DPW budget there is a line item for equipment services/rental equipment. The Finance Board decided to shift this \$60,000 line item into TIP. The Town Municipal employees' pension (not Teachers) increased about 27 percent. The state determines how much municipalities will contribute to the plan.

Proposed funding to capital projects include: Highway paving (\$500k); DPW Plow truck (\$200k); Fire Truck Lease Purchase at which Town Meeting voted a \$250,000 deposit come out of fund balance and \$115,000 per year over five years for the lease purchase; and Open Space (\$50k) We continue to contribute to the Board of Education School Improvement Plan (SIP)(\$100k), Board of Education Technology (\$90k) and Board of Education Athletic Facilities (\$30k).

Chairman Charron noted there has not been anything included in this budget for the DPW project as it has not been approved. If approved funding will be reflected in next year's fiscal budget. The Recreation Commission had asked for about \$75,000 for field maintenance and dugouts. At the end of this year, Board will look at surplus and figure out if some of that surplus could be used for this project and a soccer field.

The Board of Finance did not put funding into the Library project. With the ownership of the Green settled, there is nothing holding up the Library project. Town approved to move to short term and eventually long-term borrowing. Due to unknowns and timing, the Finance Board decided to wait and may begin funding next year.

Board of Education requested 2.88%, however, the Board of Finance adjusted to 2.0%. Some of the logic includes declining enrollment over the years and our revenue has decreased from the state and out of town tuition. Revenue has gone down about \$1 million per year. The expense side has gone up and the revenue down, and the Finance Board feels that this is a reasonable amount for the Board of Education to provide a great education for our students. Special Education costs are still unknown and if required, the Finance Board will consider coming to Town Meeting and request money come out of fund balance to offset any excess special education costs.

The amount to be raised by taxes is going up by 3.6%. The grand list went up is 3.5% and this results in a flat mil rate. This is the same mil rate three years in row. The new assessment received will indicate if it increased or decreased, and this will determine if your taxes go up by that same percentage or down by that same percentage.

This budget will be voted on this evening. The Board of Finance feels bringing this budget forward, and if approved, there is not much risk from the revenue from the state. The fund balance is at \$3.9 million which is about 18 percent of the proposed budget. The Board feels this budget is healthy. If the budget fails, the Board of Selectmen will set a temporary mil rate. Only contractual increases are allowed. This could cause issues with managing the town. No spending on capital until budget approved.

Superintendent Robert Angeli spoke to the question as follows: The Lebanon Public Schools builds its budget to support its Strategic Plan building on initiatives to guide for new things into the district to achieve these goals. Building into this budget are staff initiatives which include a Board-Certified Behavior Analyst that provides support for special education students which is currently contracted out. Developing a Special Education program, Students Centered Alternative Learning Environment and Supports (SCALES), which if properly staffed could become a tuition generating program for the district. Proposed to restructure the IT staff from three part time to two full time IT Techs which would

have increased this item by \$17,180. We may need to reconsider with the Finance Board request to reduce from 2.88% to 2.0%. A teaching position will be reallocated into the Math Coach/Intervention Specialist position for the Middle School and will not cost additional money. The total budget for these added positions is an increase of \$58,180.00.

New course offerings at the High School include English, Social Studies, Science, World Language and Physical Education some of which are college level courses. Additional programs to meet the needs of our Special Education students will occur at all levels. These include transition planning for students at the High School and Daily Living Skills offered at the High School; SCALES at all three schools and added Life Skills programming at the Elementary School.

Staffing changes built into the 2.88% increase include the restructuring of the Assistant Principal position at the High School from a full time to part time. That person would also have some teaching assignments. Instructional Assistant positions will be reduced by three. The contract for EMCOR would not be renewed which now provides for facilities management and a maintenance person. This is for two people, a truck and substitute. The district would hire our own Facilities Manager and Maintenance person with a savings of about \$45,000. Declining enrollment would reduce staff in the Middle School by one classroom teacher and music department by one music teacher. These are changes that will get us to 2.88%. There will be additional changes if our budget is a 2.0% increase.

Board of Education drivers for this budget are salaries, health and life insurances, special education, heating oil and diesel fuel. Special Education costs had anticipated to go down next year. Late in the budget process there were changes in our enrollment. This budget fluctuates as students move into or out of district, students that are here and become eligible for special education services or have exited special education. We were predicting a decrease, but now see a possible impact of \$200k for next year. A bulk of the budget is for salaries and benefits.

This budget follows two years of the lowest increases. Salaries and benefits, special education, facilities, transportation and tuition programs are all contractual. Salaries and benefits make up over 70 percent of the budget. Tuitions could be for outsourced students we cannot educate here because of needs the district cannot meet or for Magnet School programs our students might be attending. All of these equal 94% of the budget. Everything else in budget is a little over 5.5%. Special Education is about 20% of the budget which is in alignment with most districts in the state. The total budget presented is proposed at 2.88 or \$19,731,446.00.

The district applies for various federal and state grants to help support educational initiatives and increase revenue. The Idea Grant helps to fund Special Education. The Title I Grant is used primarily to pay for reading support. The Title II Grant is for professional development for teachers. The Title III Grant is to support English learners in the district. The Title IV Grant is used to increase technology education. The School Readiness Grant helps to support the Pre-K program. The Perkins Grant supports career and technical education courses at Lyman.

Other revenue received are from tuitions we charge for students that come to our district from outside Lebanon. We have agreements with other towns that they can send their students for the general program. We also take in students from several towns for the VoAg (ASTE) program. If any of these students require Special Education, the district bills out separately. We anticipate a decrease in this type of revenue next year. This may also impact our VoAg program as we receive money from the state for our own students who enter the VoAg program. There has been a decline in students going into VoAg.

ECS received this year was over \$400,000 budgeted for. The ASTE funding was about \$22,000 higher. The ECS and ASTE funding from the state is just over \$450,000 higher than budgeted for. That would be surplus for the town this year.

All we have for next year from the state is the Governor's proposed ECS funding at \$4,461,872. The Appropriations Committee proposed ECS Funding at \$4,471,063. The state has decided that municipalities fund 25 percent of the contribution for the Teachers Retirement program which would be \$50,238.

The Board of Finance reduced the Board of Education from 2.88 to 2.0. We are now in the process of cutting \$168,930.00. We are anticipating cost of \$200,000 if the children's programming proceeds as is for this year. The Board of Finance has committed to helping the Board of Education if the Special Education budget exceeds the amount budgeted. Board of Education requested \$466,000 for Capital Accounts, and the Board of Finance allocated \$220,000.

Moderator Malozzi opened the floor to questions/comments.

Keith Wentworth, Exeter Road: Is there a reason the Board of Finance increases spending every year?

Finance Board Chairman Charron: Salaries are contractual and expenses due go up. If we expect to go flat, we would have to reduce services. The Board of Finance chose not to go flat.

Keith Wentworth, Exeter Road: Believes Board of Ed should go flat. We are paying more, but residents not earning more. We should look at expenses - scale back and reduce staffing. What will happen if budget does not pass?

Finance Board Chair Liz Charron: If the budget does not pass, it does tie certain department heads. They would have to freeze discretionary spending. It does impact the way the offices would operate.

Rob Slate, Trumbull Highway: On page 33 of the Town Report, shows under Board of Education there are 1,014 students, which is a third less students. Why are we not consolidating schools? Could save on transportation, salaries and benefits. Older people have less income and believes Board of Education does not care about senior citizens in this town.

Greg Macway, Goshen Heights: What is covered in technology?

Superintendent Angeli: The money in Technology is for infrastructure in the district. The one-to-one computing program in grades 5-12 have district provide chrome books. Grades 2-4 chrome books and additional computer devices. These devices age out every five to six years. Teachers have laptop or desk top computers, and schools have computer labs. This technology account will go to support these efforts.

Rick Nelson, Lake Shore Drive: A zero mil increase is worth supporting.

Sherri Swenson, Leonard Bridge Road: People should realize value in supporting schools, town infrastructure, public works, and open space. We cannot sit and just watch. We should invest in our town. Supports increase in taxes to improve our town and continue to attract people to it.

Diane McCall, McCall Road: If people want to pay extra taxes, feel free to hand in extra taxes.

Greg Macway, Goshen Heights: Why do grade schools have chrome books?

Superintendent Angeli: Those devices did not exist when we went to school. Schools provided technology in hand. We are not on the cutting edge of technology and provide the best we can. We are operating in a responsible manner to provide the most current technology.

Moderator Malozzi called the question "Consider and act upon approving the proposed 2019–20 Fiscal Year budget for the Town of Lebanon in the amount of twenty-six million two hundred and nine thousand and one hundred and nine dollars and no cents (\$26,209,109.00) for the General Town Government, Board of Education, Special Revenue Accounts and Capital Expenditures with Revenue Estimates of six million four hundred sixty six thousand dollars, four hundred forty three dollars and no cents (\$6,466,443.00) and the remainder to be raised by taxes with an estimated mil rate of 29.4 mils." (A copy of the proposed 2019-2020 Fiscal Year budget and presentations follows these minutes.)

Voice vote called: Motion passed.

Moved by Betsy Petrie, second by John Bendoraitis to bring item 2 to the floor "Consider and act upon approving the 2019-20 Fiscal Year Capital Improvement Program (CIP) as proposed by the Board of Selectmen."

First Selectman Betsy Petrie spoke to the question as follows: The town is required to submit to the state annually a Capital improvement Plan (CIP). From this plan if the State has money in a plan called LoCIP. We can submit money for LoCIP reimbursement. This does not require the town to do these projects. We do provide to the state reimbursement for LoCIP. There are seven projects this year and changes each year.

Moderator Malozzi opened the floor to questions/comments.

Moved by Craig Huntington, second by Meghan Bruce to call the question.

Moderator Malozzi ruled out of order as the assembly has not had a chance to respond.

Brock Littlefield, Exeter Road: Is there a plan to reconstruct Smith and Randall Roads?

First Selectman Petrie: Those roads are covered by FEMA. The town cannot double-dip. This plan is just for LoCIP funding. FEMA is underway and BOS expected to approve on May 14, 2019.

Craig Huntington, Kingsley Road: Will these projects go through even if we don't get reimbursement?

First Selectman Petrie: These are projects you get funding for only if completed. You must be on this plan to get reimbursement first.

Moderator Malozzi called the question "Consider and act upon approving the 2019-20 Fiscal Year Capital Improvement Program (CIP) as proposed by the Board of Selectmen." (A copy of the CIP follows these minutes.)

Vote voice called: Motion passed.

Moderator Malozzi stated that since the Selectmen have removed the resolution to be presented under Item 3 of the Notice to referendum vote, the Town Meeting will be adjourned to referendum vote after introduction and discussion of the resolution, and the conclusion of any other business before the Town Meeting.

Moderator Malozzi asked for a motion to waive the reading of the resolution to be presented under item 3 of the Notice.

Betsy Petrie moved that the reading of the resolution to be presented to this Annual Town Meeting under item 3 of the Notice be waived and that the full text of the resolution, as made available to those in attendance at this meeting, be incorporated into the minutes of this meeting.

Moderator Malozzi asked for second on the motion. Second by Jason Huling.

Vote called: Motion passed.

Point of Order noted by Keith Wentworth stating that there should be discussion.

Moderator Malozzi stated a motion is needed from the floor to bring Item 3 forward. A presentation and discussion will follow.

Moved by Rob Slate, second by Rob Cady bring Item 3 to the floor.

To Consider a resolution

- to appropriate \$3,505,000 for costs related to the design, construction, furnishing and equipping of various Public Works facilities, contemplated to include but not be limited to: (1) on an approximately 2.5 acre portion of the 23 Goshen Hill Road property to the rear of existing Fire Safety Complex, demolition of the existing Animal Control facility and various related facilities, and construction of an approximately 13,600 square foot building containing Public Works offices, vehicle storage, maintenance and washing activities, and outdoor material storage areas; (2) at the existing Public Works facility site at 937 Trumbull Highway, the demolition of the existing Public Works facility and various related facilities, and construction of an approximately 3,600 square foot salt storage shed, a fueling island with canopy, and an outdoor material storage area, with possible renovation of and improvements to the existing Public Works garage building to provide for additional equipment storage, and (3) related facilities and improvements. The appropriation may be spent for design, construction, acquisition and installation costs, equipment, furnishings, materials, utilities, permitting costs, engineering and other consultant fees, legal fees, net interest on borrowings and other financing costs, and other expenses related to the project or its financing. The Board of Selectmen shall be authorized to determine the scope and particulars of the project, and may reduce or modify the scope of the project; and the entire appropriation may be spent on the project as so reduced or modified:
- (b) to authorize the issue bonds or notes of the Town in an amount not to exceed \$3,505,000 to finance the appropriation; to provide that the amount of bonds or notes authorized to be issued shall be reduced by any grants received for the project; to authorize the issue temporary notes of the Town in an amount not to exceed \$3,505,000 in anticipation of such bonds or notes and the receipt of project grants: to authorize a majority of the Selectmen and the Treasurer of the Town to determine the amounts, dates, interest rates, maturities, redemption provisions, form and other details of the bonds or notes, and to perform all other acts which are necessary or appropriate to issue the bonds or notes; to take such action to allow temporary advances of available funds which the Town reasonably expects will be reimbursed from the proceeds of borrowings; to authorize a majority of the Selectmen and the Treasurer to bind the Town pursuant to such representations and covenants as they deem necessary or advisable in order to maintain the continued exemption from federal income taxation of interest on the bonds or notes authorized by the resolution if issued on a tax-exempt basis, including covenants to pay rebates of investment earnings to the United States in future years; and to authorize a majority of the Selectmen and the Treasurer to make representations and enter into written agreements for the benefit of holders of the bonds or notes to provide secondary market disclosure information, which agreements may include such terms as they deem

advisable or appropriate in order to comply with applicable laws or rules pertaining to the sale or purchase of such bonds or notes; and

(c) to authorize the Board of Selectmen, the First Selectman, the Treasurer, and other proper officers and officials of the Town to take all other action which is necessary or desirable to complete the project and to issue bonds or notes and obtain grants to finance the aforesaid appropriation.

Vote called - Motion passed.

Public Works Building Committee (PWBC) Chairman Rob Cady spoke to the question as follows (a copy of presentation follows the minutes):

Building Committee regrouped to modify and reduce the overall cost of the project. The current plans are to use existing facility and the parcel behind the Fire Safety Complex on Goshen Hill Road. We were able to reduce the overall scope by 50 percent and doing so reducing overall cost by 20 percent.

The existing parcel on Goshen Hill Road will be reused. An existing building will be refurbished or replaced. The newer building on the site and salt storage shed will be constructed. The fuel depot close to pond will be relocated to a different area within the site. The approximate cost for this facility renovation is \$800,000.

The other part of this project calls for a new Public Works facility to be located behind the existing Fire Safety Complex on Goshen Hill Road. This new building is about fifty percent smaller than what was proposed up near the Middle School. There is room for a wash bay, parking of vehicles, materials storage area, a mechanics bay, a storage and wash bay, an office restroom facilities. The estimated cost for this parcel is about \$2.5 million. The total projected cost is approximately \$3.505 million which includes both parcels and any necessary costs to bond the project. Residents may vote at the Referendum on May 14th at the Fire Safety Complex on Goshen Hill Road from 6am to 8pm.

John Okonuk, Levita Road: Did the Committee consult with the Inland Wetlands Commission?

PWBC Rob Cady: Conceptual plans submitted to Inland Wetlands Commission early part of April. Site walk was this past week and was not aware of concerns. Questions should be directed to the Inland Wetlands Commission.

Keith Wentworth, Exeter Road: Disappointed that Public Hearing was called after it was decided that this project would go to Referendum.

Maurice Hebb, Congdon Road: What effect would this have on future budgets?

Finance Board Chairman Liz Charron: It would be about \$225,000 a year which is about 1/3 mil.

Kathleen Smith, East Hebron Turnpike: Would there be any federal or state funding as asked at public hearing?

PWBC Rob Cady: This project is on the CIP plan. We can apply for state grants if the project goes forward.

Sherri Swenson: Existing facility is in need of significant improvements. What would that cost be to refurbish existing facility alone?

PWBC Rob Cady: The committee has not looked at costs of refurbishing the existing facility.

AJ Dunnack, Kinglsey Road: Why did we move away from first proposal?

PWBC Rob Cady: There was some talk around town that the location was part why it did not pass. There were questions raised about what would done with the existing facility. This proposal addresses that. The Fire Safety Complex was the original placement until the ownership came up regarding the town parcels.

Jim Simeone, Lebanon Avenue: What happens if you go over the estimated cost?

PWBC Rob Cady: If this resolution is passed at referendum, we are limited to this specific amount. We cannot exceed the \$3.505 million including financing costs and we are held to that limit.

Tony Tyler, Lake Shore Drive: Why is it not worth the time to invest in what it would cost to refurbish existing the facility?

PWBC Rob Cady: The committee has been going about 4/12 years. Looked at existing facility that is about 60 years old and deteriorating. The overall size and structures are not conducive to vehicle current sizes. May entail replacing them altogether to meet the needs of the department. Upkeep and facilities may not have been done over the years. Need to construct a safer environment. Would be more efficient and economical by building something new instead of trying to rehash something old.

Tim Slate, Trumbull Highway: What is the structural deficiency of the newer building referred to?

PWBC Rob Cady: The larger of the two buildings, the concrete blocks on lower portion are beginning to deteriorate. There is no reinforcement within the hollow cinder blocks. Anchor Engineering deemed it as not reasonable to rehab that building.

Tim Slate: What would this cost be?

PWBC Rob Cady: Charge of the committee was to look at a new facility.

Tim Slate: Asked if anyone looked to privatize public works?

First Selectman Betsy Petrie: No.

Meghan Bruce, Kingsley Road: There were questions about operating costs at the Public Hearing. Have these questions been answered and where can we find them? Additionally, we don't always look at the overall impact of town projects over the long term.

PWBC Rob Cady: Has asked Anchor Engineering to prepare the operating costs.

Kim Simeone, Lebanon Avenue: Feels town does not have all the answers and needs more time on this.

Dave Scata, Levita Road: These people working at Public Works are citizens. We have allowed them to work in these appalling conditions for years. Committee has done due diligence. They have revised and reduced overall cost. The committee considers this a reasonable budget to accomplish this project. This is going to referendum and will not be voted on tonight. If you believe in infrastructure and

providing services, and rebuilding what is broken - we have to vote yes - or you can vote no. Think about the people who work there.

Jason Huling, Gregory Road: Over four years and two different proposal is not rushing. This facility is more than 60 years old and needs updating.

Rob Slate, Trumbull Highway: Stated he is a member of Inland Wetlands Commission. Commission has not met on issue, and did walk the site. Has questions he would like answered. Does not feel he could accept this proposal on this site and stated that is a personal opinion. Stated he feels that it is incorrect to have a referendum before a town board has met whether or not this impacts the site. No need to rush. If the plan is changed how would the public know before the referendum? Would like a price and bid on renovating the old facility and brought forward.

Phil Johnson, Brookview Drive: Was there anyone from the Town or current staff on the committee?

Rob: There has been representation from Public Works for 4 ½ years. About three years ago, we went to Public Works to present and communicate the plans to the staff. There has been representation from Public Works since committee formed including the current Foreman.

Dori Bruce, Kingsley Road: Town voted on a pretty picture for the Library project and ran into unexpected obstacles. Is there a way to table referendum and get more detail? Library will add a full mil to our mil rate.

Moderator Malozzi: We cannot table the referendum. This is an improper motion. Our annual town meeting allows us the purpose to conduct said business, and postponement would be out of order.

Finance Board Chairman Elizabeth Charron: Library will not add a mil. Once it goes to be bonded assuming we get \$1 million from the Connecticut Library Association and \$1 million from Trumbull Trust would be about third of mil.

Brock Littlefield, Exeter Road: Stated he is a Highway Maintainer for the town and a member of the Town Safety Committee. Looked at DEEP, OSHA and Anchor reports. Worked with Town Fire Marshall. Main concern is housekeeping. There are solar panels that do not work. DEEP and Anchor Engineering say we need to construct a permanent structure for our salt stockpile. Feel the project has been rushed and towns people have not had time to absorb. Does not believe the town has had enough time. As a member of highway department, this proposal will not help us accomplish our commission. Our mission is to maintain the roads.

Jennifer Johnson, Rita Drive: Most people don't like the cost. Why can't we take a town vote to see how much we want to spend on a project?

Keith Wentworth: Who generated the cost of building? Questions the ability of Anchor Engineering to work up figures on buildings. How did soil testing come out and you have to meet State requirements?

Rob Cady: Anchor Engineering works with several architectural firms. Committee has not looked at soil testing. This is a conceptual plan and uncertain if soil testing is required.

Nick Poppiti, Lebanon Avenue: What happens if the Wetlands Commission says site is too wet and the project is passed?

PWBC Rob Cady: Does not require Inland Wetlands Commission approval before town vote. Only Planning and Zoning requires approval with an 8-24.

Ashley Littlefield, Exeter Road: At the Public Hearing, it was asked how much was spent with Anchor Engineering.

PWBC Rob Cady: Phase 1 and Phase 2 are approximately \$120,000. Has not yet reviewed all billings.

Shane Dolan, Levita Road: What was done over the 4 1/2 years by the Committee?

PWBC Rob Cady: Committee meets the second Tuesday of each month. All meetings are open to the public. Four sites were looked at. Settled on the Fire Safety Complex and existing site. The budget was voted down last year. Committee had to wait on for budget to pass. There was also the complexity of the town ownership on the existing facility. At that time, the committee proposed the Middle School site and that was voted down.

Steve Preli, West Town Street: What will we vote on?

Kim Simeone, Lebanon Avenue: Why can't the town put off the vote so we can have more time and possibly have the vote passed.

First Selectman Petrie spoke to the question: Bond counsel manages the timing so the project and resolution could be placed on the Annual Town meeting. Otherwise, it would call for a petition.

Mike Ninteau, Club House Road: Why is Item 4 on Agenda if we cannot vote tonight?

Tim Slate: What will the interest rate of the bonding be?

First Selectman Petrie: Stated she believes it will be four percent.

Maurice Hebb, Congdon Road: What if there is a problem with the Wetlands Commission and the soil testing and the vote passes?

First Selectman Petrie: The Town will have to work through it.

Motion by David Scata, second by Fran Malozzi to close discussion.

Moderator Malozzi called for vote: Motion passed.

Moderator Malozzi advised the audience that no vote is taken on the resolution. No amendment may be made to, nor vote to approve or disapprove taken on, the resolution and read as follows:

Pursuant to Pursuant to Section 7-7 of the General Statutes to adjourn said town meeting at its conclusion and to submit the resolution to be presented under item 3 of this notice to referendum vote on Tuesday, May 14, 2019, between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. The resolution will be presented to the voters under the following heading:

"SHALL THE TOWN OF LEBANON APPROPRIATE \$3,505,000 FOR DEMOLITION OF THE EXISTING PUBLIC WORKS AND ANIMAL CONTROL FACILITIES AND CONSTRUCTION OF A NEW PUBLIC WORKS FACILITY ON THE REAR PORTION OF THE FIRE SAFETY COMPLEX PROPERTY AND RELATED FACILITIES AT THE EXISTING PUBLIC WORKS FACILITY SITE, AND AUTHORIZE THE ISSUE OF BONDS AND NOTES IN THE SAME AMOUNT TO FUND THE APPROPRIATION?"

Absentee ballots will be counted centrally in the Lebanon Fire Safety Complex at 23 Goshen Hill Road in Lebanon.

Moderator Malozzi stated Item 5 at the Annual Town Meeting is to Consider any other business proper to come before said meeting.

First Selectman Petrie addressed the audience by asking all people in the audience that presently serve on a Board, Commission or Committee to stand. The First Selectman thanked everyone for their time and service to the town. She further stated that this would be her last Annual Town meeting and thanked everyone for their support during her term.

Andy Scott asked what the Town was going to do to correct the bidding process. Jeff Drum stated he had concerns as well.

Lisa Matson, Lake Shore Drive: Thanked First Selectman Petrie and Selectman Bendoraitis for their hard work and the hours put into all projects for the town.

Jennifer Johnson, Rita Drive: Asked what was going to be done with the rear portion of the High School that is sinking.

Motion by Nick Poppiti, second by Kevin Cwikla to adjourn meeting at 9:18 PM.
