ANNUAL TOWN MEETING MAY 4, 2015

MINUTES

The Annual Town Meeting of the electors and citizens qualified to vote in Town Meetings of the Town of Lebanon, Connecticut, was held on Monday, May 4, 2015 in the Lyman Memorial High School Auditorium, 917 Exeter Road (Route 207) Lebanon, Connecticut. Number in Attendance: 153

First Selectman Joyce R. Okonuk called the meeting to order at 7:35 PM.

The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance.

First Selectman Okonuk then called for nominations for moderator.

Moved by Bert Bosse, seconded by Jan Van Woerkom to nominate Edward Tollmann as moderator. Vote called - motion passed.

Moved by Jan Van Woerkom, seconded by Phil Johnson to wave the reading of the warning of the meeting. Vote called - motion passed

Moved by Bert Bosse seconded by Jan Van Woerkom to bring item 1 to the floor. "Consider and act upon a petition requesting that the Lebanon Farmer's Market shall not be held in the area between Town Hall and Route 207.' Vote called – motion passed

First Selectman Joyce Okonuk spoke to the question as follows. The Board of Selectmen received a petition to bring item 1 to the Annual Town Meeting. The petition was circulated by T. Allan Palmer and Ed Tytor. The Board of Selectmen, Town Planner and Farmers Market Manager Phil Chester met with the petitioners at a Board of Selectmen's meeting to discuss their concerns. All parties concerned, agreed on the plan proposed by Phil Chester. The Board of Selectmen is asking you to vote no and defeat this petition.

Ed Tytor spoke to the question as follows. The American Legion Post 180 is not involved with this petition. He asked the First Selectman to put this item on the agenda of a Selectmen's meeting. When it wasn't addressed, they felt they had to do something to bring it forward. Therefore they petitioned for the item to be on the Annual Town Meeting agenda. The petition reads as follows. "Whereas: The area between the Town Hall and Route 207 has long been dedicated to the memory of the men and women who have served in the United States Armed forces to keep America free. And: While the Farmers Market is an asset to the community, it has been causing damage to this area since its inception 8 years ago and is not an activity appropriate for this hallowed area. Therefore: The Farmers Market shall not be held in the area between the Town Hall and Route 207." The Farmers Market is a benefit to the Town. Together with the Selectmen and Market Manager we have come up with an excellent plan and think the best solution would be to postpone the vote, and see how the plan progresses this market season.

Phil Chester spoke to the question as follows. The plan for the Farmers Market going forward, is to prohibit vehicles from accessing the Town Hall Green where the veterans walk and war memorials are located. Vendors will continue to sell their products from the edge of the Green, but they will be required to unload their products from their vehicles in the pavement area and then park their

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vehicles on the other side of the Green to the east of Town Hall (between Town hall and Route 87) so as not to take up any public parking spaces. With this plan there should be no impact to the veterans walk or other memorials other than the grass along the edge of the Green becoming worn as was the case before.

T. Allan Palmer motioned to postpone vote to the next Annual Town Meeting.

Moderator Tollmann stated that because there is only one regularly scheduled Town Meeting each year, the Annual Town Meeting, this matter cannot be postponed beyond tonight's meeting. The motion is out of order and denied.

Moved by Kevin Cwikla, seconded by Tim Slate to call the question. Vote called – motion passed.

Moderator Tollmann called the question. "Consider and act upon a petition requesting that the Lebanon Farmer's Market shall not be held in the area between Town Hall and Route 207." Vote called - item 1 failed

Moved by Jan Van Woerkom seconded by Meghan Bruce to bring item 2 to the floor. "Consider and act upon approving the proposed 2015–16 Fiscal Year budget for the Town of Lebanon in the amount of twenty four million nine hundred forty five thousand seven hundred eleven dollars and no cents (\$24,945,711.00) for the General Town Government, Board of Education, Special Revenue Accounts and Capital Expenditures with Revenue Estimates of seven million four hundred ninety thousand six hundred forty one dollars and no cents (\$7,490,641.00) and the remainder to be raised by taxes with an estimated mil rate of 28.7 mils, representing a 1.9% increase in the amount to be raised by taxes and to adjourn Item #2 to Referendum to be held, unless such date and times are altered by the Town Meeting, on Tuesday, May 12, 2015 between the hours of 6:00 A.M. and 8:00 P.M. Electors and persons qualified to vote in Town Meetings who are not electors, shall vote at the Fire Safety Complex, 23 Goshen Hill Road, Lebanon, Connecticut."

David Scata, Board of Finance Chairman, Board of Finance members Meghan Bruce and Liz Charron, and Board of Education member Jason Nowasad presented an over view of the proposed FY 2015-2016 Budget. (a copy of the proposed FY 15-16 budget follows these minutes)

Moderator Tollmann called the question: Vote called –item 2 passed

Moved by Jan Van Woerkom seconded by Al Vertefeuille to bring item 3 to the floor. "Consider and act upon approving the 2015-16 Fiscal Year Capital Improvement Program (CIP) as proposed by the Board of Selectmen."

First Selectman Joyce Okonuk explained the line items listed in the proposed FY 2015-2016 Local Capital Improvement Program (CIP), as recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Okonuk further noted that in order to apply for grants under the State of Connecticut CIP, the municipality must have a program in place that is approved at the annual town meeting. (A copy of the proposed FY 2015-16 CIP follows these minutes)

Moderator Tollmann called the question: Vote called - item 3 passed

Moved by Jan Van Woerkom seconded by Al Vertefeuille to bring item 4 to the floor.

To consider a Resolution,

- to appropriate \$4,240,000 for costs related to the design and construction of improvements to various roads and bridges, including: (a) improvements to Bascom Road and such other roads as are determined by the Board of Selectmen following, if applicable, referral of such improvements to the Town Planning and Zoning Commission for a report pursuant to Section 8-24 of the General Statutes of Connecticut, Revision of 1958, as amended; (b) payment to the Town of Columbia of the Town of Lebanon's share of the costs of the reconstruction of Baker Hill Road Bridge; (c) rehabilitation of the following bridges: Chappell Road Bridge over Susquetonscut Brook, Tobacco Street Bridge over Brousseous Brook, Goshen Hill Road Bridge over Exeter Brook, Bender Road Culvert over Susquetonscut Brook, Card Street Culvert over unnamed brook, Church Road Culvert over unnamed brook and Olenick Road Culvert over unnamed brook; (d) related work and improvements; and (e) costs related to the financing thereof. The appropriation may be spent for design, construction, acquisition, installation costs, equipment, materials, utilities, permitting costs, engineering and other consultant fees, legal fees, land and easement acquisition, net interest on borrowings and other financing costs, and other expenses related to the project or its financing. The Board of Selectmen shall be authorized to determine the scope and particulars of the project; and may reduce or modify the scope of the project, and the entire appropriation may be spent on the project as so reduced or modified;
- (b) to authorize the issue of bonds or notes of the Town in an amount not to exceed \$4,240,000 to finance the appropriation; to provide that the amount of bonds or notes authorized to be issued shall be reduced by any grants received for the project; to authorize the issue temporary notes of the Town in an amount not to exceed \$4,240,000 in anticipation of such bonds or notes and the receipt of project grants: and to authorize a majority of the Selectmen and the Treasurer of the Town to determine the amounts, dates, interest rates, maturities, redemption provisions, form and other details of the bonds or notes; and to perform all other acts which are necessary or appropriate to issue the bonds or notes;
- (c) to take such action to allow temporary advances of available funds which the Town reasonably expects will be reimbursed from the proceeds of borrowings; and to authorize a majority of the Selectmen and the Treasurer to bind the Town pursuant to such representations and covenants as they deem necessary or advisable in order to maintain the continued exemption from federal income taxation of interest on the bonds or notes authorized by the Resolution if issued on a tax-exempt basis, including covenants to pay rebates of investment earnings to the United States in future years; and to authorize a majority of the Selectmen and the Treasurer to make representations and enter into written agreements for the benefit of holders of the bonds or notes to provide secondary market disclosure information, which agreements may include such terms as they deem advisable or appropriate in order to comply with applicable laws or rules pertaining to the sale or purchase of such bonds or notes; and
- (d) to authorize the First Selectman, on behalf of the Town, to apply for and accept grants or loans to finance the appropriation for the project, and to enter into any grant or loan agreement; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen, the First Selectman, the Treasurer, and other proper officers and officials of the Town to take all other action which is necessary or desirable to complete the project and to issue bonds or notes and obtain grants to finance the aforesaid appropriation.

The Resolution was discussed. Dave Scata stated that the expenditures for the roads and bridges projects are built into the FY2015-2016 proposed budget. Therefore, if the project is approved, there will be no impact to the FY 2015-2016 budget.

(copy of the full Resolution follows these minutes)

Moved by Jan Van Woerkom seconded by Al Vertefeuille to bring item 5 to the floor. *To consider a Resolution*,

- to appropriate \$5,875,000 for costs related to the design, construction and equipping of additions, alterations and renovations to the Jonathan Trumbull Library, and for costs related to the financing thereof. The project is contemplated to include additions of approximately 7,406 square feet, renovations to approximately 7,032 square feet of the existing building and improvements providing complete wheelchair accessibility, and related work and improvements; and to be completed substantially in accordance with architectural drawings and elevations dated 12/22/14. prepared by Jay Willerup, AIA of Jacunski Humes Architects, LLC, Berlin, CT, a copy of which is on file in the office of the Lebanon Town Clerk and available for public inspection during normal business hours. The appropriation may be spent for design, construction, acquisition, installation costs, equipment, furnishings, materials, utilities, permitting costs, grant management and other administrative costs, architects' fees, engineering and other consultant fees, legal fees, net interest on borrowings and other financing costs, and other expenses related to the project or its financing. The Town anticipates receiving grants in the estimated amount of \$1,000,000 from the State of Connecticut Library Board (Grant 071P-SC-13) and in the estimated amount of \$1,000,000 from The Hugh Leander Adams, Mary Trumbull Adams and Hugh Trumbull Adams Town Memorial Fund to defray in part the appropriation for the project. The Library Building Committee established by the Town Meeting for the project shall be authorized to determine the scope and particulars of the project; and may reduce or modify the scope of the project, and the entire appropriation may be spent on the project as so reduced or modified;
- (b) to authorize the issue of bonds or notes of the Town in an amount not to exceed \$5,875,000 to finance the appropriation; to provide that the amount of bonds or notes authorized to be issued shall be reduced by any grants received for the project; to authorize the issue temporary notes of the Town in an amount not to exceed \$5,875,000 in anticipation of such bonds or notes and the receipt of project grants; and to authorize a majority of the Selectmen and the Treasurer of the Town to determine the amounts, dates, interest rates, maturities, redemption provisions, form and other details of the bonds or notes; and to perform all other acts which are necessary or appropriate to issue the bonds or notes;
- (c) to take such action to allow temporary advances of available funds which the Town reasonably expects will be reimbursed from the proceeds of borrowings; and to authorize a majority of the Selectmen and the Treasurer to bind the Town pursuant to such representations and covenants as they deem necessary or advisable in order to maintain the continued exemption from federal income taxation of interest on the bonds or notes authorized by the Resolution if issued on a tax-exempt basis, including covenants to pay rebates of investment earnings to the United States in future years; and to authorize a majority of the Selectmen and the Treasurer to make representations and enter into written agreements for the benefit of holders of the bonds or notes to provide secondary market disclosure information, which agreements may include such terms as they deem advisable or appropriate in order to comply with applicable laws or rules pertaining to the sale or purchase of such bonds or notes; and
- (d) to authorize the First Selectman, on behalf of the Town, to apply for and accept grants to finance the appropriation for the project, and to enter into any grant agreement; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen, the First Selectman, the Treasurer, the Library Building Committee established by the Town Meeting for the project, and other proper officers and officials of the Town to take all other action which is necessary or desirable to complete the project and to issue bonds or notes and obtain grants to finance the aforesaid appropriation.

The Resolution was discussed. Concerns regarding the lack of handicap accessibility in the existing building were expressed, as well as a concerns regarding the proposed parking lot encroaching on the Green, and the impact the project would have on the proposed FY 2015-2016 budget.

Liz Charron stated that the Library project will not impact the FY2015-2016 proposed budget. However, if the project is approved, it is expected to impact the mil rate by .4 mills in the FY 2016-2017 budget. (copy of the full Resolution follows these minutes)

Moved by Al Vetetfeuille, seconded by Jim Mello to stop discussion and move to item 6. Vote called – motion passed

Moved by Al Vertefeuille, seconded by Jim Mello to bring item 6 to the floor "Consider and act upon the following:"

1. Pursuant to Section 7-7 of the Connecticut General Statutes to adjourn said town meeting at its conclusion and to submit the Resolutions to be presented under items 4 and 5 of this notice to referendum vote on Tuesday, May 12, 2015, between the hours of 6:00 A.M. and 8:00 P.M.

Electors and persons qualified to vote in Town Meetings who are not electors will vote at the following polling place: Lebanon Fire Safety Complex, 23 Goshen Hill Road, Lebanon, Connecticut.

The aforesaid Resolutions to be presented under items 4 and 5 of this notice will be presented to the voters under the following headings, respectively:

"SHALL THE TOWN OF LEBANON APPROPRIATE \$4,240,000 FOR COSTS RELATED TO DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION OF VARIOUS ROAD AND BRIDGE IMPROVEMENTS, AND AUTHORIZE THE ISSUE OF BONDS AND NOTES IN THE SAME AMOUNT TO FINANCE THE APPROPRIATION?"

"SHALL THE TOWN OF LEBANON APPROPRIATE \$5,875,000 FOR COSTS RELATED TO THE DESIGN, CONSTRUCTION AND EQUIPPING OF ADDITIONS, ALTERATIONS AND RENOVATIONS TO THE JONATHAN TRUMBULL LIBRARY, AND AUTHORIZE THE ISSUE OF BONDS AND NOTES TO FINANCE THE PORTION OF APPROPRIATION NOT DEFRAYED FROM GRANTS?"

Voters approving the Resolutions will vote "Yes" and those opposing the Resolutions will vote "No."

Absentee ballots will be available from the Town Clerk's Office.

Moderator Tollmann called the question: Vote called - item 6 passed

Moved Jan Van Woerkom, seconded by Al Vertefeuille to bring item 7 to the floor. "Consider and act upon a Resolution to approve Commercial Property Assessed Clean Energy ("C-Pace") Agreement."

First Selectman Joyce Okonuk introduced Alex Kovtunenko, a representative of the Connecticut Green Bank, an agency which administers the statewide C-Pace program. Mr. Kovtunenko explained that C-Pace is a financing tool allowing for energy upgrades in buildings to be financed with third party capital and repaid through an assessment on the building's property tax bill.

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(a copy of the C-Pace Agreement follows these minutes)

Moderator Tollmann called the question: Vote called – item 7 passed

Moved by Jan Van Woerkom, seconded by Al Vertefeuille to bring item 8 to the floor. "Consider any other business proper to come before said meeting."

Tim Slate thanked Moderator Ed Tollmann for his many years of service to the town.

Moved by Jan Van Woerkom, seconded by John Bendoraitis to adjourn at 9:35 PM. Vote called – motion passed

A RESOLUTION TO APPROVE COMMERCIAL PROPERTY ASSESSED CLEAN ENERGY ("C-PACE") AGREEMENT

WHEREAS, Section 16a-40g, as amended, of the Connecticut General Statutes (the "Act") established a program, known as the Commercial Property Assessed Clean Energy (C-PACE) program, to facilitate loan financing for clean energy improvements to commercial properties by utilizing a state or local assessment mechanism to provide security for repayment of the loans; and

WHEREAS, the Act authorizes the Connecticut Green Bank (the "Green Bank"), a public instrumentality and political subdivision of the State charged with implementing the C-PACE program on behalf of the State, to enter into a written agreement with participating municipalities pursuant to which the municipality may agree to assess, collect, remit and assign, benefit assessments to the Green Bank in return for energy improvements for benefited property owners within the municipality and for costs reasonably incurred by the municipality in performing such duties; and

WHEREAS, the Commercial Property Assessed Clean Energy ("C-PACE") Agreement (the "C-PACE Agreement") between the Town of Lebanon and the Green Bank, as attached hereto, constitutes the written agreement authorized by the Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

- (a) that we, the Board of Selectmen, as authorized by Town Meeting on May 4, 2015, constituting the legislative body of the Town of Lebanon , hereby approve the C-PACE Agreement, and
- (b) that Joyce Okonuk, First Selectman is hereby authorized and directed, on behalf of the Town, to execute and deliver the C-PACE Agreement, substantially in the form attached to this Resolution, for the purposes provided therein, together with such other documents as he or she may determine to be necessary and appropriate to evidence, secure and otherwise complete the C-PACE Agreement.

RESOLUTION APPROPRIATING \$4,240,000 FOR COSTS RELATED TO DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION OF VARIOUS ROAD AND BRIDGE IMPROVEMENTS, AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUE OF BONDS AND NOTES IN THE SAME AMOUNT TO FINANCE THE APPROPRIATION

RESOLVED,

- That the Town of Lebanon appropriate FOUR MILLION TWO HUNDRED FORTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$4,240,000) for costs related to the design and construction of improvements to various roads and bridges, including: (a) improvements to Bascom Road and such other roads as are determined by the Board of Selectmen following, if applicable, referral of such improvements to the Town Planning and Zoning Commission for a report pursuant to Section 8-24 of the General Statutes of Connecticut, Revision of 1958, as amended; (b) payment to the Town of Columbia of the Town of Lebanon's share of the costs of the reconstruction of Baker Hill Road Bridge; (c) rehabilitation of the following bridges: Chappell Road Bridge over Susquetonscut Brook, Tobacco Street Bridge over Brousseous Brook, Goshen Hill Road Bridge over Exeter Brook, Bender Road Culvert over Susquetonscut Brook, Card Street Culvert over unnamed brook, Church Road Culvert over unnamed brook and Olenick Road Culvert over unnamed brook; (d) related work and improvements; and (e) costs related to the financing thereof. The appropriation may be spent for design, construction, acquisition, installation costs, equipment, materials, utilities, permitting costs, engineering and other consultant fees. legal fees, land and easement acquisition, net interest on borrowings and other financing costs, and other expenses related to the project or its financing. The Board of Selectmen is authorized to determine the scope and particulars of the project; and may reduce or modify the scope of the project, and the entire appropriation may be spent on the project as so reduced or modified.
- 2. That the Town issue its bonds or notes, in an amount not to exceed FOUR MILLION TWO HUNDRED FORTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$4,240,000) to finance the appropriation for the project. The amount of bonds or notes issued shall be reduced by the amount of grants received by the Town for the project. The bonds or notes shall be issued pursuant to Section 7-369 of the General Statutes of Connecticut, Revision of 1958, as amended, and any other enabling acts. The bonds or notes shall be general obligations of the Town secured by the irrevocable pledge of the full faith and credit of the Town.
- 3. That the Town issue and renew its temporary notes from time to time in anticipation of the receipt of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds or notes and the receipt of grants for the project. The amount of the notes outstanding at any time shall not exceed FOUR MILLION TWO HUNDRED FORTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$4,240,000). The notes shall be issued pursuant to Section 7-378 of the General Statutes of Connecticut, Revision of 1958, as amended, and any other enabling acts. The notes shall be general obligations of the Town secured by the irrevocable pledge of the full faith and credit of the Town. The Town shall comply with the provisions of Section 7-378a of the General Statutes with respect to any temporary notes if the notes do not mature within the time permitted by said Section 7-378.
- 4. That the Selectmen, or a majority of them, and the Treasurer of the Town shall sign any bonds or notes by their manual or facsimile signatures. The law firm of Day Pitney LLP is designated as bond counsel to approve the legality of the bonds or notes. The Selectmen, or a majority of them, and the Treasurer are authorized to determine the amounts, dates, interest rates, maturities, redemption provisions, form and other details of the bonds or notes; to designate one or more banks or trust companies to be certifying bank, registrar, transfer agent and paying agent for the bonds or notes; to provide for the keeping of a record of the bonds or notes; to designate a financial advisor to the Town in connection with

the sale of the bonds or notes; to sell the bonds or notes at public or private sale; to deliver the bonds or notes; and to perform all other acts which are necessary or appropriate to issue the bonds or notes.

- 5. That the Town hereby declares its official intent under Federal Income Tax Regulation Section 1.150-2 that project costs may be paid from temporary advances of available funds and that (except to the extent reimbursed from grant moneys) the Town reasonably expects to reimburse any such advances from the proceeds of borrowings in an aggregate principal amount not in excess of the amount of borrowing authorized above for the project. The Selectmen, or a majority of them, and the Treasurer are authorized to amend such declaration of official intent as they deem necessary or advisable and to bind the Town pursuant to such representations and covenants as they deem necessary or advisable in order to maintain the continued exemption from federal income taxation of interest on the bonds or notes authorized by this resolution, if issued on a tax-exempt basis, including covenants to pay rebates of investment earnings to the United States in future years.
- 6. That the Selectmen, or a majority of them, and the Treasurer are authorized to make representations and enter into written agreements for the benefit of holders of the bonds or notes to provide secondary market disclosure information, which agreements may include such terms as they deem advisable or appropriate in order to comply with applicable laws or rules pertaining to the sale or purchase of such bonds or notes.
- 7. That the First Selectman, on behalf of the Town, is authorized to apply for and accept grants and loans to finance the appropriation for the project, and to enter into any grant or loan agreement prescribed by the State of Connecticut or any other grantor or lender, and the Board of Selectmen, the First Selectman, the Treasurer, and other proper officers and officials of the Town are authorized to take any other actions necessary to obtain such grants or loans, including without limitation grants or loans pursuant to the Local Bridge Program (Chapter 240, Part IIb of the General Statutes of Connecticut, Revision of 1958, as amended), or to any other present or future legislation, and to implement such grant or loan agreements. Any grant proceeds may be used to pay project costs or principal and interest on bonds or notes issued to finance the project.
- 8. That the Board of Selectmen, the First Selectman, the Treasurer, and other proper officers and officials of the Town are authorized to take all other action which is necessary or desirable to complete the project and to issue bonds or notes and obtain grants to finance the aforesaid appropriation.

RESOLVED,

- That the Town of Lebanon appropriate FIVE MILLION EIGHT HUNDRED SEVENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$5,875,000) for costs related to the design, construction and equipping of additions, alterations and renovations to the Jonathan Trumbull Library, and for costs related to the financing thereof. The project is contemplated to include additions of approximately 7,406 square feet, renovations to approximately 7,032 square feet of the existing building and improvements providing complete wheelchair accessibility, and related work and improvements; and to be completed substantially in accordance with architectural drawings and elevations dated 12/22/14, prepared by Jay Willerup, AIA of Jacunski Humes Architects, LLC, Berlin, CT. The appropriation may be spent for design, construction, acquisition, installation costs, equipment, furnishings, materials, utilities, permitting costs, grant management and other administrative costs, architects' fees, engineering and other consultant fees, legal fees, net interest on borrowings and other financing costs, and other expenses related to the project or its financing. The Town anticipates receiving grants in the estimated amount of \$1,000,000 from the State of Connecticut Library Board (Grant 071P-SC-13) and in the estimated amount of \$1,000,000 from The Hugh Leander Adams, Mary Trumbull Adams and Hugh Trumbull Adams Town Memorial Fund to defray in part the appropriation for the project. The Library Building Committee established by the Town Meeting for the project is authorized to determine the scope and particulars of the project; and may reduce or modify the scope of the project, and the entire appropriation may be spent on the project as so reduced or modified.
- 2. That the Town issue its bonds or notes, in an amount not to exceed FIVE MILLION EIGHT HUNDRED SEVENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$5,875,000) to finance the appropriation for the project. The amount of bonds or notes issued shall be reduced by the amount of grants received by the Town for the project. The bonds or notes shall be issued pursuant to Section 7-369 of the General Statutes of Connecticut, Revision of 1958, as amended, and any other enabling acts. The bonds or notes shall be general obligations of the Town secured by the irrevocable pledge of the full faith and credit of the Town.
- 3. That the Town issue and renew its temporary notes from time to time in anticipation of the receipt of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds or notes and the receipt of grants for the project. The amount of the notes outstanding at any time shall not exceed FIVE MILLION EIGHT HUNDRED SEVENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$5,875,000). The notes shall be issued pursuant to Section 7-378 of the General Statutes of Connecticut, Revision of 1958, as amended, and any other enabling acts. The notes shall be general obligations of the Town secured by the irrevocable pledge of the full faith and credit of the Town. The Town shall comply with the provisions of Section 7-378a of the General Statutes with respect to any temporary notes if the notes do not mature within the time permitted by said Section 7-378.
- 4. That the Selectmen, or a majority of them, and the Treasurer of the Town shall sign any bonds or notes by their manual or facsimile signatures. The law firm of Day Pitney LLP is designated as bond counsel to approve the legality of the bonds or notes. The Selectmen, or a majority of them, and the Treasurer are authorized to determine the amounts, dates, interest rates, maturities, redemption provisions, form and other details of the bonds or notes; to designate one or more banks or trust companies to be certifying bank, registrar, transfer agent and paying agent for the bonds or notes; to provide for the keeping of a record of the bonds or notes; to designate a financial advisor to the Town in connection with the sale of the bonds or notes; to sell the bonds or notes at public or private sale; to deliver the bonds or notes; and to perform all other acts which are necessary or appropriate to issue the bonds or notes.

- 5. That the Town hereby declares its official intent under Federal Income Tax Regulation Section 1.150-2 that project costs may be paid from temporary advances of available funds and that (except to the extent reimbursed from grant moneys) the Town reasonably expects to reimburse any such advances from the proceeds of borrowings in an aggregate principal amount not in excess of the amount of borrowing authorized above for the project. The Selectmen, or a majority of them, and the Treasurer are authorized to amend such declaration of official intent as they deem necessary or advisable and to bind the Town pursuant to such representations and covenants as they deem necessary or advisable in order to maintain the continued exemption from federal income taxation of interest on the bonds or notes authorized by this resolution, if issued on a tax-exempt basis, including covenants to pay rebates of investment earnings to the United States in future years.
- 6. That the Selectmen, or a majority of them, and the Treasurer are authorized to make representations and enter into written agreements for the benefit of holders of the bonds or notes to provide secondary market disclosure information, which agreements may include such terms as they deem advisable or appropriate in order to comply with applicable laws or rules pertaining to the sale or purchase of such bonds or notes.
- 7. That the First Selectman, on behalf of the Town, is authorized to apply for and accept grants to finance the appropriation for the project, and to enter into any grant agreement prescribed by the State of Connecticut or any other grantor, and the Board of Selectmen, the First Selectman, the Treasurer, the Library Building Committee established by the Town Meeting for the project, and other proper officers and officials of the Town are authorized to take any other actions necessary to obtain such grants and or implement such grant agreements. Any grant proceeds may be used to pay project costs or principal and interest on bonds or notes issued to finance the project.
- 8. That the Board of Selectmen, the First Selectman, the Treasurer, the Library Building Committee established by the Town Meeting for the project, and other proper officers and officials of the Town are authorized to take all other action which is necessary or desirable to complete the project and to issue bonds or notes and obtain grants to finance the aforesaid appropriation.
